Data point of the month:

Elm Street School currently has 255 students enrolled. (254 enrolled in-person & 1 enrolled in ReeL)

Attendance

- -Our average daily attendance rate for the month of October was 91.54%.
- -At the end of October we had 59 students who were considered chronically absent having missed 10% or more of the school year. At this point in the year, this represents any student who has missed 4 days of school or more. This represents 23% of our population.
- -We of course know that many of these absences are due to being out with symptoms or quarantines. Our focus is on having students be here when they are well and able to attend.

Behavior

- -Average of 7 ODRs per day (National Average is 1.03) for the month of October. -Average of 3.53 major referrals per day and average of 3.47 minor behavior referrals per day.

Minot Consolidated School currently has 227 students enrolled. (226 enrolled in-person & 1 enrolled in ReeL)

Attendance

-At the end of October we had 83 students who were considered chronically absent having missed 10% or more of the school year. At this point of the year, this represents any student who has missed 4 days of school or more. This represents 36/6% of our populations.

-We of course know that many of these absences are due to being out with symptoms or quarantines. Our focus is on having students be here when they are well and able to attend.

Behavior

-Average of 4.21 ODRs per day (National Average is 1.03) for the month of October. -80 total referrals in October (21 majors/59 minors)

-87% of students received no ODRs for the month of October, with a goal of at least 80%.

Poland Community School currently has 437 students enrolled. (430 enrolled in person, 7 Functional Life Skills Middle School, 2 enrolled in ReeL)

Attendance

- -As of October 28th we had 62% of students (with quarantine) who were considered chronically absent have missed 10% or more of the school year. Without quarantine or symptoms that indicate COVID-19 the number of chronically absent students would be 6%. At this point of the year, this represents any student who has missed 4 days of school or more.

This additional training came after the diagnostic test was administered and helped to train teachers on how to use the results and the resources within the program to provide instruction to individual or small groups of students.

-Grade levels have been meeting with our district's Literacy Coach for professional development in phonics for grades K-2 and writing in grades 3-6.

-Staff wrote professional learning goals and met with teams to share goals as part of the TEPG (Teacher Evaluation) process. -PCS school counselors presented Second

-PCS school counselors presented Second Step professional development to emphasize common language, unpack students clapping to celebrate their induction into the reader's club. Our sixth graders created presentations on their



personal reading books to share their connections to the characters, and how they identified the author's purpose within the text.

Professional Development:

- -Grade levels have been meeting with our district's Literacy Coach for professional development in phonics for grades K-2 and writing in grades 3-6.
- -Staff from MCS and ESS joined together for continued training on our i-Ready program. Teachers learned how to run reports, drill into their data, and design academic interventions for their classroom based on their data.
- -Elm Street School staff began their committee meetings during our PD time. Our four committee groups are connected to our school-wide goals for Second Step, PBIS, and student/staff culture.
- -Teachers have continued to connect with their GLP's (grade level planning teams) across the district) to unpack math units.
- -Teachers went through the process of developing professional learning goals as part of the Teacher Evaluation Program.

-Substitute Teachers & Custodians -Special Education Support Staff -Staff received additional training on the Second Step Program, which is our Tier I social emotional learning program. The training will help staff to have a common understanding of what is being taught to students in SEL class so that they are able to support all students in using the strategies when situations arise within the school day. We will continue this work at the start of each unit.

-Teachers went through the process of developing professional learning goals as part of the Teacher Evaluation Program.
-One of our school-wide goals this year is around collaboration. This past month, we started a book study with teaching staff around professional learning communities.

- -A standby generator
