Data point of the month:

As of November 1, Elm Street School has 248 students enrolled in grades PK-6.

Attendance

-Our average daily attendance rate for this year is 93.71%.

As of the end of October, we had 45 students who were considered chronically absent having missed 10% or more of the school year. At this point of the year, this represents any student who has missed 4.1 days of school or more. This represents 18% of our population.

Behavior:

-Average of 3.00 ODRs per day (National Average is 1.03) for the month of October -57 total referrals in October (32 majors/25 minors)

-89.51% of students received no ODRs for the month of October, with a goal of at least 80%.

Highlights of the past Month:

*September's Hootie Award Winner, Robin Arris selected our new Kindergarten teacher, Rebecca Albert to receive the Hootie Award for the month of October. Rebecca was nominated by Robin because of her constant smile, words of encouragement, and for creating a warm and welcoming classroom environment for her students and staff.

*Our Kindergarten students participated in their "We are Readers" parade through the halls of our school. The students and staff lined the hallways to



welcome our newest readers to the Wildcat Family.

Data point of the month:

Minot Consolidated School currently has 219 students enrolled in grades PK-6.

Attendance

-As of the end of October, we had 35 students who were considered chronically absent having missed 10% or more of the school year. At this point of the year, this represents any student who has missed 4.1 days of school or more. This represents 16% of our populations.

Behavior

-Average of 4.21 ODRs per day (National Average is 1.03) for the month of October -80 total referrals in October (30 majors/50 minors)

-86% of students received no ODRs for the month of October, with a goal of at least 80%.

Highlights of the past Month:

-Since our last board report, we have had both our September and October Mustang Pride Assembly. (We are back in person this year!) Two Students from each class received a Mustang Pride Certificate from their teacher. We had 3 students receive Books-A-Million cards for their work on PBIS.



-We have had two staff members receive the Horace Mann Hootie Award for their dedication to our students. Septembers recipient was Ms. Jenkins our new Music Teacher. October's recipient was our custodian, Gerry Pray. We are so grateful for all they do for our community!





Data point of the month:

As of November 1, Poland Community School has 444 students currently enrolled, this number includes our Functional Life Skills students.

Attendance:

As of October 31, 2022, 20% of our students are chronically absent. At this time, we have 7 truant students. We have begun working on improving attendance and holding truancy meetings.

Behavior:

We decreased the number of ODRS from 184 to 142 this month, an average of 7 a day. Our school counselors have been focusing on working with teachers on developing relationships with students and addressing student behavior issues collaboratively. We are fortunate to have two counselors to help us address the needs of our student population. More often than not, the resources we have are still not enough to address the needs we have. We often find ourselves looking for help from any available teacher to support students with movement breaks, de-escalation strategies, and facilitating restorative conversations and work when the school counselors, administration and the restorative room educational technician is working with students.



Highlights of the past Month:

*Our fourth grade students welcomed students and staff into their classroom for a writing celebration. Our fourth graders did a great job sharing their stories!

*We hosted the Mechanic Falls Fire
Department for Fire Safety Day. We had a
whole school assembly with lots of fun
challenges for our students, staff, and
firefighters. The highlight of the assembly
was the tug of war competition between the
fire department and members of our local
Mechanic Falls Police Department. With a
little help from the ESS staff, the Mechanic
Falls PD came out with the win! After the

assembly, students were given an



opportunity to see the Fire Trucks and the firefighters presented to grade levels about fire safety and the importance of having a plan!

*We completed our Bullying Prevention Month during October. We had dress-up days with different themes that aligned with our Second Step Bullying Prevention curriculum. In addition to our dress up days, Mrs. Jenkins, our Dean of Students visited students in grades 3-6 to begin teaching our Second Step Bullying Prevention Curriculum. She will begin her lessons with students in grades K-2 during November.

*Our Wildcat Family Connection helped host a high-energy performer, Jason Tardy, to present his important message on being an





Staff Professional Development:

This training was important for our staff because it afforded them an opportunity to have a guided practice using the program.

This month, staff also had time with our Literacy Specialist, Kelly LaBonte. Kelly has been meeting with each grade level weekly to discuss how to improve Tier I instruction. The three elementary schools also worked together to plan for the upcoming unit this month on one of our extended days.
