PRHS list of scholarships - check this now and then continue to check it often! New scholarships will continually be added throughout the school year.

FREE COMMUNITY COLLEGE is still on the radar for the Class of 2023, as well as PRHS AND ADULT ED CLASSES OF 2020, 2021, 2022. In order to be eligible for free tuition and fees from any of the 7 community colleges in Maine the student must:

- 1.) Apply to the <u>community college</u>. Each community college has its own online application and we find it takes most students 10-15 minutes to complete.
- 2.) Do the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). The Finance Authority of Maine (FAME) has the best <u>resources</u> to get you started. Their materials, websites, and videos will walk you through step by step.
- 3.) Plan to attend full time with 4-5 classes.. Remember that full time in college looks different than it does for high school.

That's it! Students will need to let their counselor know that they have applied, so that we can send their transcript. Contact your student's school counselor if you have any questions. As long as the funding is still available, each of those classes will need to be enrolled by Spring 2024. **Just do it!**

LEWISTON REGIONAL TECHNICAL CENTER - Final decisions for 2023-2024 will be mailed over April break - check your mailbox! Newly accepted students will be invited to an Orientation at LRTC on May 30.

COLLEGE FAIR - The NEACAC College Fair will be held on May 18 from 9-11 at the Augusta Civic Center. Hundreds of colleges will be in attendance.

JROTC (Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps) is available at Lewiston HS for interested PRHS students. We currently have students who attend JROTC at LHS for two blocks every other day. Students travel via the LRTC bus to get to Lewiston HS. While this is an Air Force JROTC program, students are not committed to any branch of the military. This program gives them experience, leadership and drills training, as well as aeronautical training. For more information, students should check in with their school counselor.

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Health Office BROWNTAIL MOTHS

As the weather gets warmer, the browntail moth season is upon us from April to early July. The browntail moth is an invasive species that is a human health concern. Maine is the only state in the U.S. currently experiencing widespread problems with this moth. The microscopic hairs found on browntail moth caterpillars, shed skins, and cocoons can cause skin reactions and breathing problems. The symptoms include a localized rash similar to poison ivy that will last for a few hours up to several days. The rash can be severe and last for weeks. The hairs can become airborne and cause trouble breathing, including respiratory distress, if inhaled. The symptoms result from both a chemical reaction to a toxin in the hairs and a physical irritation as the barbed hairs become embedded in the skin and airways. The hairs from caterpillars, shed skins, and cocoons can become airborne and settle on vegetation and other surfaces. They can be stirred up during mowing, raking, sweeping, and other outdoor activities. The hairs remain toxic for 1-3 years in the environment but lose their toxicity over time. There are ways to mitigate exposures to the browntail moths such as avoiding places heavily infested by caterpillars, take cool showers and change clothes after any activity that may expose you to browntail moth hairs, and dry laundry inside during June and July to avoid having the hairs embedded in clothing.

Immuninizations

Reminder letters for all students that will need their MCV4 (Meningococcal Meningitis Vaccine) prior to 12th grade entry have been mailed out. One dose of quadrivalent meningococcal conjugate vaccine (MCV4) is required for students entering grade seven. Any student entering grade twelve is required to have received two doses of MCV4. The first dose must have been received on or after the eleventh birthday, and the second dose must have been received on or after the sixteenth birthday, at least eight weeks after the first dose. However, if the first dose is administered when the student is sixteen years of age or older, only one dose is required. Please reach out to the nurses office if you have any questions and update us once your student has received their vaccine.
